*The Chief: The Life of William Randolph Hearst* by David Nasaw. New York, NY: Houghton Mifflin Company, 2000. A thoroughly researched, elegant, and fairly written account of the life of the media mogul and extraordinary art collector.

*The Spiral Staircase: My Climb Out Of Darkness* by Karen Armstrong. New York, NY: Anchor Books, 2004. A powerful memoir from an important theological voice.

*Farley - the Life of Farley Mowat* by James King. An uneven though frequently excellent biography of Canada's favorite son.

**Alexander Hamilton.** by Ron Chernow. Very informative if an overly long and somewhat sycophantic description of Hamilton's remarkable contributions to founding the federal government and economy.

*James Madison and the Creation of the American Republic* by Jack N. Rakove. A description of Madison's impressive professional and political accomplishments, thus not truly a biography. Nonetheless highly informative even if pretty dry.

*His Excellency: George Washington* by Joseph Ellis. A readable book that demythologizes the first president and presents him with all of his warts as well as his strengths.

**Thomas Jefferson:** A Life by Willard Sterne Randhall. A lengthy but engrossing and gracefully crafted biography of one of America's most influential people.

**Benjamin Franklin:** An American Life by Walter Isaacson. Fascinating biography of a shrewd, crafty, and phenomenally influential politician.

*Stalin: Breaker of Nations* by Robert Conquest. A chilling portrait drawing on recently released archives.

A Brush With Darkness: Learning to Paint After Losing My Sight by Lisa Fittipaldi. Intriguing and sometimes harrowing story of how, after being blinded at the age of 47, Lisa became a renowned painter.

**Patrick O'Brian:** A Life by Dean King. Interesting reading for fans of the 20 Jack Aubrey/Stephen Maturin novels.

*Lincoln's Virtues--An Ethical Biography* by William Lee Miller. Good insight into the moral development of a great politician.

Blue Latitudes--Boldly Going Where Captain Cook Has Gone Before by Tony Horwitz. A

great read about Captain Cook and the places he went.

*Cocaine--An Unauthorized Biography* by Dominic Streatfield. Informative history of the drug and its human impact in all its facets.

*Noam Chomsky--A Life of Dissent* by Robert F. Barsky. Interesting biography of one of this century's most profound thinkers.

*Churchill* by Roy Jenkins. Outstanding work of history and a masterpiece biography.
